9 (1) ADMINISTRATOR.—The term "Adminis10 trator" means the Administrator of the Federal
11 Emergency Management Agency.
12 (2) AGENCY.—The term "Agency" means the
13 Federal Emergency Management Agency.

14 (3) EMERGENCY.—The term "emergency"
15 means an emergency declared by the President

4	(4) Equitable.—The term "equitable" means
5	having or exhibiting equity.
6	(5) Equity.—The term "equity" means—

8	vancement, equal opportunity, access for under-
9	served communities and other individuals;
10	(B) the elimination of barriers that have
11	prevented full participation for underserved
12	communities; and
13	(C) the reduction of disparate outcomes.
14	(6) FEDERAL ASSISTANCE.—The term "Federal
15	assistance" means assistance provided pursuant to—
16	(A) a declaration of a major disaster or
17	emergency;
18	(B) sections 203 and 205 of the Robert T.
19	Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assist-
20	ance Act (42 U.S.C. 5133, 5135); and
21	(C) section 1366 of the National Flood In-
22	surance Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 4104c).
23	(7) MAJOR DISASTER.—The term "major dis-
24	aster" means a major disaster declared by the Presi-
25	dent under section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford

1	Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42)
2	U.S.C. 5170).
3	(8) UNDERSERVED COMMUNITY.—The term
4	"underserved community" means—
5	(A) the Native-American and Alaskan-Na-
6	tive community;
7	(B) the African-American community;
8	(C) the Asian community;
9	(D) the Hispanic community (including in-
10	dividuals of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, and
11	Central or South American origin);
12	(E) the Pacific Islander community;
13	(F) the Middle Eastern and North African
14	community;
15	(G) a rural community;
16	(H) a low-income community;
17	(I) individuals with disabilities;
18	(J) a limited English proficiency commu-
19	nity;
20	(K) other individuals or communities oth-
21	erwise adversely affected by persistent poverty
22	or inequality; and
23	(L) any other disadvantaged community,
24	as determined by the Administrator.

TITLE I—ENSURING EQUITY IN FEDERAL DISASTER MANAGE MENT

4 SEC. 101. DATA COLLECTION, ANALYSIS, AND CRITERIA.

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the 6 date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator, in con-7 sultation with the Secretary of Housing and Urban Devel-8 opment and the Administrator of the Small Business Ad-9 ministration, shall develop and implement a process to en-10 sure equity in the provision of Federal assistance and 11 throughout all programs and policies of the Agency.

12 (b) SPECIFIC AREAS FOR CONSULTATION.—In car-13 rying out subsection (a), the Administrator shall identify 14 requirements for ensuring the quality, consistency, acces-15 sibility, and availability of information necessary to iden-16 tify programs and policies of the Agency that may not sup-17 port the provision of equitable Federal assistance, includ-18 ing—

- 19 (1) information requirements;
- 20 (2) data sources and collection methods; and
- 21 (3) strategies for overcoming data or other in-22 formation challenges.

(c) MODIFICATION OF DATA COLLECTION SYSTEMS.—The Administrator shall modify the data collection systems of the Agency based on the process developed

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under subsection (a) to ensure the quality, consistency, ac cessibility, and availability of information necessary to
 identify any programs and policies of the Agency that may
 not support the provision of equitable Federal assistance.
 SEC. 102. CRITERIA FOR ENSURING EQUITY IN POLICIES
 AND PROGRAMS.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the 8 date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator shall de-9 velop, disseminate, and update, as appropriate, criteria to 10 apply to policies and programs of the Agency to ensure 11 equity in the provision of Federal assistance and through-12 out all programs and policies of the Agency.

13 (b) CONSULTATION.—In developing and dissemi14 nating the criteria required under subsection (a), the Ad15 ministrator shall consult with—

16 (1) the Officer for Civil Rights and Civil Lib-17 erties of the Department of Homeland Security;

18 (2) the Secretary of Housing and Urban Devel-19 opment; and

20 (3) the Administrator of the Small Business21 Administration.

22 (c) INTEGRATION OF CRITERIA.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—To the maximum extent possible, the Administrator shall integrate the criteria
developed under subsection (a) into existing and fu-

1	ture processes relating to the provision of Federal
2	assistance.
3	(2) PRIORITY.—The Administrator shall
4	prioritize integrating the criteria under paragraph
5	(1) into processes relating to the provision of—
6	(A) assistance under sections 402, 403,
7	406, 407, 428, and 502 of the Robert T. Staf-
8	ford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance
9	Act (42 U.S.C. 5170a, 5170b, 5172, 5173,
10	5189f, 5193);
11	(B) Federal assistance to individuals and
12	households under section 408 of such Act (42
13	U.S.C. 5174);
14	(C) hazard mitigation assistance under
15	section 404 of such Act (42 U.S.C. $5170c$); and
16	(D) predisaster hazard mitigation assist-
17	ance under section 203 of such Act (42 U.S.C.
18	5133).
19	SEC. 103. METRICS; REPORT.
20	(a) METRICS.—In carrying out this title, the Admin-
21	istrator shall—
22	(1) establish metrics to measure the efficacy of
23	the process developed under section $101(a)$ and the
24	criteria developed under section 102(a); and

(2) seek input from relevant representatives of
 State, regional, local, and Tribal governments, rep resentatives of community-based organizations, sub ject matter experts, and individuals from under served communities impacted by disasters.

6 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the dis-7 semination of the criteria under section 102(a), and annu-8 ally thereafter, the Administrator shall submit to Congress 9 a report describing how the criteria and processes devel-10 oped under this title have impacted efforts to ensure eq-11 uity in the provision of Federal assistance and throughout 12 all programs and policies of the Agency, including—

(1) any obstacles identified or areas for improvement, with respect to implementation of such
criteria and processes, including any recommended
legislative changes;

17 (2) the effectiveness of such criteria and proc18 esses, as measured by the metrics established under
19 subsection (a)(1); and

20 (3) any impacts of such criteria and processes
21 on the provision of Federal assistance, with specific
22 attention to impacts relating to efforts within the
23 Agency to address barriers to access and reduce dis24 parate outcomes.

1 TITLE II—OPERATIONAL EN 2 HANCEMENT TO IMPROVE 3 EQUITY IN FEDERAL DIS 4 ASTER MANAGEMENT

5 SEC. 201. EQUITY ADVISOR.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—

7 (1) DESIGNATION.—The Administrator shall
8 designate a senior official within the Agency as an
9 equity advisor to the Administrator.

10 (2) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The equity advisory
11 designated under paragraph (1) shall be responsible
12 for advising the Administrator on efforts of the
13 Agency to ensure equity in the provision of Federal
14 assistance and throughout all programs and policies
15 of the Agency.

(b) QUALIFICATIONS.—In designating an equity advisor under subsection (a)(1), the Administrator shall select
an individual who is a qualified expert with significant experience with respect to equity policy, civil rights policy,
or programmatic reforms.

(c) DUTIES.—In addition to advising the Administrator, the equity advisor designated under subsection
(a)(1) shall—

(1) participate in the implementation of sec-tions 101 and 102;

1 (2) monitor equity in the implementation of eq-2 uity efforts within the Agency and within regions of 3 the Agency to ensure consistency in the implementa-4 tion of policy or programmatic changes intended to 5 ensure equity in the provision of Federal assistance 6 and throughout all programs and policies of the 7 Agency;

8 (3) identify ways to improve the policies and 9 programs of the Agency to ensure that such policies 10 and programs are equitable, including enhancing op-11 portunities to support underserved populations in 12 preparedness, mitigation, protection, response, and 13 recovery; and

14 (4) any other activities the Administrator con-15 siders appropriate.

16 (d) CONSULTATION.—In carrying out the duties under this section, the equity advisor designate under sub-17 18 section (a)(1) shall, on an ongoing basis, consult with rep-19 resentatives of underserved communities, including com-20 munities directly impacted by disasters, to evaluate oppor-21 tunities and develop approaches to advancing equity with-22 in the Agency, including by increasing coordination, com-23 munication, and engagement with—

24 (1) community-based organizations;

25 (2) civil rights organizations;

1 (3) institutions of higher education; 2 (4) research institutions; 3 (5) academic organizations specializing in diver-4 sity, equity, and inclusion issues; and 5 (6) religious and faith-based organizations. 6 SEC. 202. EQUITY ENTERPRISE STEERING GROUP. 7 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established within 8 the Agency a steering group to advise the Administrator 9 on how to ensure equity in the provision of Federal assist-10 ance and throughout all programs and policies of the 11 Agency. 12 (b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In carrying out subsection 13 (a), the steering group established under this section 14 shall— 15 (1) review and, as appropriate, recommend 16 changes to Agency-wide policies, procedures, plans, 17 and guidance; 18 (2) support the development and implementa-19 tion of the processes and criteria developed under 20 title I; and 21 (3) monitor the integration and establishment 22 of metrics developed under section 103. 23 (c) COMPOSITION.—The Administrator shall appoint 24 the following individuals as members of the steering group 25 established under subsection (a):

1	(1) Representatives from each of the following
2	offices of the Agency:
3	(A) The Office of Equal Rights.
4	(B) The Office of Response and Recovery.
5	(C) Federal Emergency Management
6	Agency Resilience.
7	(D) The Office of Disability Integration

11	(F) The mission support office of the
12	Agency.
13	(G) The Office of Chief Counsel.
14	(H) The Office of the Chief Financial Offi-
15	cer.
16	(I) The Office of Policy and Program
17	Analysis.
18	(J) The Office of External Affairs.
19	(2) The administrator of each regional office of
20	the Agency or a designee.
21	(3) The equity advisor designated by the Ad-
22	ministrator under section $201(a)(1)$.
23	(4) A representative from the Office for Civil
24	Rights and Civil Liberties of the Department of
25	Homeland Security.

(5) The Superintendent of the Emergency Man agement Institute.

3 (6) The National Tribal Affairs Advisor of the4 Agency.

5 (7) Any other official of the Agency the Admin-6 istrator determines appropriate.

7 (d) LEADERSHIP.—The Administrator shall des8 ignate 1 or more members of the steering group estab9 lished under subsection (a) to serve as chair of the steering
10 group.

SEC. 203. GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE REVIEW OF EQUITY REFORMS.

Not later than 3 years after the date of enactment
of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States
shall issue a report to evaluate the implementation of this
title and title I.

21 SEC. 301. GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE REVIEW

OF FACTORS TO DETERMINE ASSISTANCE.

23 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the24 date of enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General

of the United States shall issue a report that describing
 the factors the Agency considers—
 (1) when evaluating a request from a Governor
 to declare that a major disaster or emergency exists;
 and

6 (2) to authorize assistance under sections 402,
7 403, 406, 407, 408, 428, and 502 of the Robert T.
8 Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance
9 Act (42 U.S.C. 5170a, 5170b, 5170c, 5172, 5173,
10 5189f, 5193).

(b) CONTENTS.—The report issued under subsection(a) shall include—

13 (1) an assessment of—

14 (A) the degree to which the factors the
15 Agency considers when evaluating a request for
16 a major disaster or emergency declaration—

(i) affect equity for underserved communities, particularly with respect to
major disaster and emergency declaration
requests, approvals of such requests, and
the authorization of assistance described in
subsection (a)(2); and

23 (ii) are designed to deliver equitable24 outcomes;

1	(B) how the Agency uses such factors or
2	monitors whether such factors result in equi-
3	table outcomes;
4	(C) the extent to which major disaster and
5	emergency declaration requests, approvals of
6	such requests, and the authorization of assist-
7	ance described in subsection (a)(2), are more
8	highly correlated with high-income counties
9	compared to lower-income counties;
10	(D) whether the process and administra-
11	tive steps for conducting preliminary damage
12	assessments are equitable; and
13	(E) to the extent practicable, whether such
14	factors may deter a Governor from seeking a
15	major disaster or emergency declaration for po-
16	tentially eligible counties; and
17	(2) a consideration of the extent to which such
18	factors affect underserved communities—
19	(A) of varying size;
20	(B) with varying population density and
21	demographic characteristics;
22	(C) with limited emergency management
23	staff and resources; and
24	(D) located in urban or rural areas.

1 (c) RECOMMENDATIONS.—The Comptroller General 2 of the United States shall include in the report issued 3 under subsection (a) any recommendations for changes to 4 the factors the Agency considers when evaluating a re-5 quest for a major disaster or emergency declaration to ac-6 count for underserved communities.
