Dear Mr. Zuckerberg:

We write to inquire about the disposition of the \$22 million that your company reportedly paid to President Trump's library fund in light of the dissolution of the organization created to steward this fund.¹

On January 29, 2025 – nine days after President Trump's second inauguration – Meta Platforms, Inc. ("Meta") announced that it had reached an agreement to settle a lawsuit President Trump brought against the company in 2021.² Out of the \$25 million Meta reportedly agreed to pay President Trump, \$22 million was to "go toward a fund for President Trump's library."³

Six weeks earlier, on December 20, 2024, the Donald J. Trump Presidential Library Fund, Inc. (Fund) was incorporated in Florida by Jacob Roth,⁴ then a lawyer at the Dhillon Law Group, which represented President Trump in fighting a subpoena from a congressional Jan. 6 investigation⁵ and whose named partner, Harmeet Dhillon, is now an Assistant Attorney General in President Trump's Department of Justice.⁶ The Fund was incorporated shortly after ABC

News (ABC) concluded a similar settlement agreement with President Trump, under which it would pay \$15 million to his library.⁷ According to the text of ABC’s agreement – which, unlike Meta’s, has been made public – the money was to be transferred to President Trump’s escrow agent within 10 days.⁸ For Meta, that would have been in early February.

Then, in mid February, Roth filed articles of amendment, which changed the “specific purpose” of the Fund from “preserv[ing] and steward[ing] the legacy of President Donald J. Trump and his presidency”⁹ to “charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code,”¹⁰ provided that “[u]pon the dissolution of this organization, assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of section 501(c) (3) . . . or shall be distributed to the federal government, or to a state or local government, for a public purpose,”¹¹ and included standard 501(c)(3) language on private inurement.¹² These amendments were likely made to secure recognition of 501(c)(3) status from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), without which ABC’s donation could not be transferred out of escrow into the Fund, per its settlement agreement.¹³

On May 19, a second nonprofit, the Donald J. Trump Presidential Library Foundation, Inc. (“Foundation”) was formed “to steward, preserve, and celebrate the legacy and historical record of President Donald J. Trump and his presidency” — once again in Florida but this time by a different incorporator and registered agent.¹⁴ It is unclear why a second nonprofit entity with substantially the same stated purpose was formed.¹⁵

On September 26, the Fund was administratively dissolved by Florida’s Department of State after the organization failed to submit a mandatory annual report.¹⁶ On December 29, Roth filed articles of dissolution for the Fund.¹⁷

In other words, the Fund is now gone, and the public has no clarity about the current location or purpose of the funds provided by Meta or any other source. Before its dissolution, the Fund may have contained as much as \$63 million in settlements from ABC, X, Paramount, and your company alone.¹⁸ There have been no disclosures about the Fund’s disposition of any funds,¹⁹ and the White House press office has not responded to requests for comment.²⁰ There appears to be no individual taking responsibility for the closure of the Fund and disposition of its money: no Fund board members were ever appointed,²¹ and the only person to sign any of its public documents, Roth, has minimized his role, stating that “[m]y job is simply to be the registrant.”²² Roth appears to no longer be with the Dhillon Law Group.²³

Your company paid the President \$22 million shortly after he took office.²⁴ If your payment was crafted as a “Charitable Contribution” to his future library, as ABC’s was,²⁵ your company could have deducted this payment from its income and avoided paying taxes on it. But now it is unclear where this money has gone, exacerbating concerns about corruption that were raised at the time of the settlement.²⁶ To address our concerns about this matter, we ask that you provide answers to the following questions by March 23, 2026:

1. What were the terms and conditions of your settlement agreement with President Trump?

- a. Did the agreement provide that Meta would make its payment to a specific entity or specific entities?
 - i. If so, what entity or entities did it specify? And which entity or entities did you in fact pay?
 - b. Did the agreement provide a timetable for the payment?
 - c. Did the agreement condition payment on IRS recognition?
 - d. Did the agreement characterize the payment as a charitable contribution?
2. When did Meta make its donation to President Trump's library fund?
 - a. If more than one date is pertinent, please provide a timeline of events.
 3. When Meta made its donation to President Trump's library fund, were you aware of the possibility that the fund could be closed and your contribution transferred to another entity?
 - a. Did the settlement agreement include any terms related to the potential transfer of the funds to another entity? If so, what were the terms?
 4. Are you aware of the disposition of this contribution now that the Fund has been closed?
 5. Were you provided any notice or opportunity for approval of any transfer of funds?
 6. Did your company deduct, or does it plan to deduct, its payment to President Trump's library as a charitable contribution and therefore avoid paying taxes on it?
